In 2006 my friend, Helga Marcar met me in a village school ministering to children at Villa Mar parish as associate pastor. She observed my relationship with children during

Mass, my approach to life, and my interactions with others, telling me that it was uniquely impressive.

A year later I was appointed to my current position as Diocesan youth chaplain. Realizing the enormous work I had been entrusted with, Ms Helga wanted to support us. Ms. Helga felt an opportunity to do something as a witness to starving children without clothing, children dying for lack of medical treatment, and children without education.

She said she had little but would help me get exposure. She organized travel for me to the UK and Belgium to make connections and solicit support to begin work for what I was called to do.

Fast forward, I met his friend from Montgomery Catholic, Jeff Barranco ('97), who without knowing me introduced me to his friend, Father Bill Skoneki. It all unfolded like a well set plan. God was in it. Eventually I arrived in America which would not have happened without the generosity of Daniel Johnston and Jeff Barranco.

Over time my life and the life of the children in Uganda has been impacted by the prayers, support and love of the people in America, and more so of the children at MCPS.

Working with MCPS students keeps me young with a joyful heart and

our faith MUST BE shared with others. That is what we have to live for.

There are many signs of growth and confidence, signs of maturity and purpose. Anna from middle school brought me \$40 in pennies as her personal collection to help our mission and promised she will do more next year. I felt so honored for her spirit. You continue to pray for us and indeed we do experience your prayers and such is what we need to keep doing.

There is still a long way to go, but together we can do it and we must. The uphill task is tremendously difficult but it's achievable. I invite all your ideas and continued support. I want to see the American children come to experience what they have contributed to in Uganda and I want them to grow up knowing that they are important and what they are doing is equally important in shaping the world they are living in.

Professing the Faith in Difficult Times

St. Polycarp was born about 65AD and as a young man was a disciple of St. John the Evangelist. It was probably St. John who ordained him bishop of Smyrna (a city now located in Turkey). St. Polycarp would eventually be martyred (155AD) but before his martyrdom he had disciples too. One of these was a young man named Irenaeus (born 130AD) who was born in Smyrna but later left his home town to serve as a priest in Lyons, France. He was chosen to serve as the second bishop of Lyons after the first bishop of Lyons was martyred. St. Irenaeus himself was martyred (202AD) for witnessing to the faith after serving more than 20 years as bishop.

The purpose of mentioning these men is two-fold. First, it reminds us that despite the persecutions and martyrdoms of the early Church, the faith continued to spread. The faith to which St. Irenaeus witnessed by his death continued to be taught and lived in Lyons. About 1,600 years after the martyrdom of St. Irenaeus, a young seminarian named Michael Portier left his home in Lyons in 1817, just as Irenaeus had, in order to serve the Church where there was a need for priests. He journeyed to America and, to make a long story short, eventually became the first bishop of Mobile. The faith passed from John to Polycarp to Irenaeus and on through the centuries in Lyons made its way to Alabama. Our archdiocese of Mobile is tied back to St. John in a very visible manner.

The other purpose for mentioning this history is that it teaches us that we must profess the faith even when times are difficult. The early history of the faith in Lyons is replete with the stories of martyrs. This did not end with ancient times. Some of Michael Portier's relatives in Lyons were put to death during the French Revolution in the 1790's for refusing to abandon the Catholic faith.

We live in a new moment in our country. Our American culture has been grounded in our Judeo-Christian values, but today is different. Our increasingly secular society is becoming progressively hostile to people of faith and we, as previous generations, will need to learn how to be people of faith in a hostile environment.

We are not facing physical persecution resulting in executions, but we are gradually facing governmental actions which assail our ability to practice our faith. State and Federal governments are using tax emptions, licensing, governmental contracts, and liability for violations of public accommodations

statutes as ways to coerce people to act in ways contrary to their faith. I came across two recent examples of this: A United Methodist pavilion in New Jersey which lost its property tax exemption for refusing to allow a same sex "marriage" on its property and a florist in Washington State who describes herself as a "Christian woman" who is being prosecuted by the State Attorney General for refusing to accept a request to provide flowers for a same sex "marriage."

Standing up for the sanctity of life, the Gospel teaching on marriage, and religious liberty will not be easy. Sometimes it is not easy to be a follower of the Lord. Previous generations of Christians knew this. We may be called to relearn that being a Christian can require a sacrifice. However, we are also strengthened by the words of Jesus: "Everyone who acknowledges me before others I will acknowledge before my heavenly Father. But whoever denies me before others, I will deny before my heavenly Father." (Matthew 10)

The fact that you are receiving this year's edition of Nowadays signifies in some form or fashion that you have a heart for Montgomery Catholic Preparatory School. You have given us your greatest treasure, your children to educate, you have generously donated countless hours to the service of the school in the support of its mission, and you have donated monetarily in order to continue the work begun by the Sisters of Loretto in 1873.

This year the student body of MCPS was 832 strong in grades K4 through 12. We were able to open the Holy Spirit Campus and the pre-kindergarten classes at both St. Bede and Holy Spirit. Our students continue to excel both in and outside of the classroom. We had two National

Merit finalists, Giselle Simms and Zach Hulcher. Both of these students were educated solely in our system. Our second through eighth grader scored well above the national average on the Iowa Test of Basic Skills and our elementary, middle, and high school students continue to outperform others on the ACRE test, a nationally normed test of knowledge of the Catholic faith. Athletically, our students had a great year, as you will see in the article written by Travis Jarome, our Athletic Director. Our school continues to lead our students to give back to others through charitable acts of service. The MCPS community raised over \$10,000 for the support of Fr. Michael Ssenfuma's Anawim Ministry. This money helped to fund essentials things for the education of the students in Buterbere such as desks, concrete

flooring, and a water collection system. At the same time, the students in this small African village were giving us something even more valuable, their prayers. It is a win-win situation for both student bodies.

So many people give their most valued gift to MCPS, time. Archbishop Rodi is a frequent visitor to the campuses of MCPS. The students have the privilege of knowing him on a personal level and enjoy his visits to their classes. Our local priests are phenomenal in their support of the school through their willingness to say Mass, hear confessions, visit classes, and stand in carpool line. Their presence and their living out the Gospel sets us apart from all other schools.

Parent involvement is an integral part of the fabric of MCPS. From concession stands to field trip chaperones, parents are responsible for the helping to make these extra-curricular activities happen. I know that their heart is in this school because I realize the sacrifices that they make in order to provide Catholic education for their children.

BUSINESSOFFICE UPDATE 2 FINANCIAL REPORT2012-2

From a financial standpoint, the 2012-2013 year is best characterized as a year committed to investments in classroom technology and continued progress in reducing the MCPS building debt. Both of these initiatives are

very important as we strive to utilize our available funds to equip our classrooms with the latest and best technology, while at the same time strengthening our balance sheet by reducing the debt related to our recent capital building projects.

Technology Investments: The two primary focuses this year were, first, to equip our new Holy Spirit campus with the necessary classroom technology to allow our teachers to be both efficient and effective, and second, to begin preparing for the High School's 1 to 1 Laptop Initiative that will kick off for the 2013-2014 school year.



At the High School a MacBook Air cart was purchased, which allowed us to pilot the 1 to 1 Initiative in ninth grade social studies classrooms. This \$30,000 investment allowed us to start integrating additional

technology resources into our curriculum. Additionally, our Middle School and High School teachers

were all equipped with laptops, which is a significant step in preparing our faculty for the new laptop initiative.

The 1 to 1 Laptop Initiative will begin by equipping all of our 9th and 10th grade students with MacBooks, then adding

the incoming freshman class in each of the following two years. The MCPS investment to purchase the 150 laptops and supporting insurance, security, and accessories totaled nearly \$200,000. The laptops are being provided to our families on a lease to own program, which will be paid annually over their high school term.

I hope this summary of recent technology investments allows you to understand the high level of commitment we have in providing our students the most up to date learning environment possible.

Debt Reduction: We began the 2012-2013 school year with long term


building debt totaling \$1,550,000. We are happy to report that our debt level has been reduced to \$1,145,000 as of June 30, 2013. The significant \$405,000 reduction of debt was made possible by the continuing capital support of our families, MCPS donors, and recent market opportunities. We will continue to focus on reducing our debt as it not only strengthens our balance sheet, but also helps position us for future capital projects.

At Holy Spirit we installed Smart Boards in each classroom, a \$35,000 investment. The Smart Boards allow our teachers to utilize their classroom computers to download and share internet materials to facilitate their lessons. Additionally, we purchased an iPad cart (\$15,000) that can be moved from classroom to classroom, allowing all of our students (up to 30 at a time) to benefit from lessons utilizing internet technology.

Established 1994. Each year Montgomery Catholic awards one full tuition scholarship to a deserving high school age candidate in the name of Robby Vide, a graduate of the school who died suddenly at the age of 29. The Vide Scholarship is given to a student who exemplifies the qualities of Robby's life: a strong record of scholarship, participation in extra-curriculars and athletics, and a zest for life.

Coach Ralph Furlong Scholarship:

Established 1998. Initiated by a member of his 1946 football team, the intent of this scholarship is to honor one of Catholic's greatest coaches, whose record of 24 straight wins from 1947-1949 remains a school record. The Furlong scholarship is a partial tuition scholarship of \$1,000, given to a high school student who demonstrates a commitment to both extra-curriculars and his or her studies.

The Legacy Scholarship:

Established 2006. Named in honor of teachers of MCPS, this tuition scholarship gives scholarships of \$2,500 each to two qualified new students. It was originally established through the generous benefaction of Mrs. Catherine Martin, class of 1937, and her family to give students the chance to attend Catholic who could otherwise not afford to do so.

Frye, Arban, Ortega Scholarship:

Established 2007. The Frye, Arban, Ortega (FAO) Scholarship seeks to honor Mr. Bernard Frye, Coach Joseph Arban, and Mrs. Alice Ortega, teachers who have given over 100 years of combined service to Montgomery Catholic Preparatory School. In their name, it rewards a scholarship to one graduating senior

This project was piloted in the 9th grade history classrooms last school year with a rolling Macbook lab that will continue to be in service for other grades, increasing our ability to serve the tech needs of our growing community. The school chose the lease-to-own program through Apple based on its proven leadership in educational support and the robust durability of the hardware and software.

We are excited for the future and giving our Knights the tools needed to prepare them for employment in a tech-savvy workforce. We ask for the intercession of St. Isidore, patron saint of computers, for our successful One to One Laptop Initiative!

In a driving rain storm in the summer of 1992, I first arrived at the then Montgomery Catholic High School. Faustin Weber had hired me, sight unseen, after an extensive telephone interview. I had no idea what to expect, and neither did he! The stress and long hours of a first year teacher were exhausting. I have to admit on the first day of class I was a little shocked by the fact that the students were not in uniforms. The kids looked like rag-amuffins! (We've come a long way.) But despite their shaggy and unkempt appearance, there was something special about the kids I taught. Many had been together from preschool and acted more like siblings and cousins then classmates. Others, many of them military dependants, were just here for a year. It was inspiring to watch their interactions.

That first year was a great year for me. Faustin and Doctor Doyle were great mentors. Some of our practices in those days were a bit unconventional, but I found CHS to be a place that took Faith Formation serious and treated our kids with respect and demanded a lot out of them. That has not changed, but a great deal has changed! The uniforms were a welcome change, for me at least. I'm, also, looking forward to the two adjustments in the dress code for next year at the middle/high



school - no shorts and no hoodies, thank you Archbishop Rodi and Mr. Barwick, respectively. We have gone from monthly Masses in the gym, to weekly Masses in the Dolly Barranco Center, plus Mass three more days a week in the chapel! We have gone from a one hallway school to an impressive state-of-the-art educational complex. We even have year round climate control. We no longer have to wait for Doc to decide that 93° temperatures in the classroom impedes student learning. When I first got to CHS, you had to go to the President's office to ask for chalk, and you were begrudgingly awarded two sticks. Today MCPS has Smart boards in every classroom! (Wow, no chalk dust on my clerical shirt!)

I was very impressed with those young men and women I taught at CHS over twenty years ago, and I remain impressed

with the young men and women MCPS is producing today - Academy appointments, National Merit Finalists, and graduates at MIT, Harvard, and a couple of Seminarians. But please don't think that I judge our children solely on academic success. More importantly we have produced good people. My favorite story of success involves a student whose graduation was doubtful at times during his senior year. He did graduate, and if he had gone to college he would be dead or in jail today. He knew it, and his parents and I knew it. Instead, he enlisted in the military, served honorably and grew up. He has a great job and a beautiful family that I see at Mass every Sunday. A success story!

Please don't get me wrong. It might sound like I'm saying how much better MCPS is than the CHS of old. While we are better in terms of facilities and opportunities, this Montgomery Catholic community, in my experience, has always been extraordinary. There was something here in the early 1990's that made me change my life plans and ask to become a priest

of the Archdiocese of Mobile, and that something is still here. CHS and MCPS have always been the heart of the Catholic community here in Montgomery. I hope and pray that it remains beating strong for another 138 years. This truly has been and continues to be an adult community that is committed to raising young men and women of Faith, Virtue, and Wisdom.

CATHOLIC KNIGHTS

What a great time to be a MONTGOMERY CATHOLIC KNIGHT! Knights fans can proudly reflect on an incredible year for the athletic department.

Congratulations to all of our teams who qualified for the postseason, many breaking through years of frustration to get there. The volleyball team qualified for regional play for the first time since 2009 by virtue of winning their area tournament, and the boys cross country team claimed their first-ever state championship - the first state championship in 12 years for Montgomery Catholic athletics.

As the seasons turned from fall to winter, the wrestling team finished 10th in the state of Alabama with just two wrestlers represented at the state level. Eighthgrader Zachary Van Alst claimed his second consecutive state title in the 106-pound weight class, while David Norris recorded his highest finish at the state tournament when he finished third in his weight class. Not to be outdone by wrestling by wrestling, the indoor track and field team came away with many state medalists but none more decorated than eighth-grader Kylie Frank who brought home three runner-up medals.

The spring brought much success as four teams challenged for state championships, first with the girls soccer team. The Knights qualified for the playoffs for the first time since 2007 when they finished second in the area to Saint James; however, they lost to two-time defending state champion Montgomery Academy in the opening round. The golf

team gualified for the AHSAA Sub-State Tournament, finishing fourth in the AHSAA Sectional Tournament - a tournament that many expected the Knights to blow through in 2012.

The baseball team set a new standard this year as they qualified for the playoffs for the first time since 2008 when they won their area. By hosting a first round series, the Knights did so for the first time since 2005; and by advancing to the second round, the Knights squashed 20 years of frustration of not getting through the first round when they hosted Slocomb.

The softball Knights also broke through in a big way this season as they won the regular season area and the area tournament. By doing so, they earned a bid to the AHSAA Regionals in Gulf Shores, where, for the first time since 2005, they advanced to the AHSAA State Tournament as the second qualifier out of the region by winning three games on the last day - including a 1-0 victory over Geneva with seventh-inning heroics and a 4-2, 12-inning win over Opp.

The Knights had two student-athletes earn All-American honors, six earn All-State honors, 16 All-Metro selections through the winter season, and eight student-athletes who have signed or will walk-on at their respective colleges and universities next fall. (Spring All Metro not available at the time of publication)

others are doing, by worrying about what Montgomery Catholic is doing.



In today's world, it is important to be proactive and not reactive in the world of athletics and we are committed to making our facilities the best in the area, and our teams the best in the state.

I think we can all agree that it is great to be a Knight. Regardless of the outcome of any game, we will continue to celebrate the accomplishments of our student-athletes from 2012-13 as they have made their mark in Montgomery Catholic athletics and set the bar high.

It is up to all of us to help future Montgomery Catholic teams have a chance to do the same. For all of you who have supported us along the way, thank you for your support. The Marching Knights do a great job of representing MCPS and earn high scores at these events, but they also received straight Superior ratings from every judge in every section at the Huntingdon Marching Invitational. This was the first time in school history to make this accomplishment.

Also in October, the MCPS Band held our annual Fall Concert, the first concert band performance of the year. This concert was a great success in featuring our Middle and High School students performing a large variety of music literature.

In December, the Band's annual Christmas Concert was held, introducing the first performance for the 6th grade Beginning Band students. They began their musical careers with much acclaim and applause. Additionally a group of students from our Middle School campus represented Montgomery Catholic at the 2012 Southeastern United States Middle School Honor Bands at Troy University. Those selected included Mary Katherine Brunson, Audrey Kim, and Kenneth Bell. These students applied and were selected from a very large body of applicants from around the southeast.

In January, a large number of our Band members auditioned for the Alabama

All-District and All-State Honor Bands. Hundreds of students from our area of the state try out for these highly competitive ensembles, and an above-average number of our students earned a place in them. Selected for the All-District Honor Band were **Adam Bristol, David Bender, Audrey Kim, Henry Petters, Will Brunson, Eric Crenshaw, Katie McDaniel, William Russell, Mary Reagan Starrett,**

Logan Stevens, and Beth Vaughan. Selected for the very prestigious All-State Honor Bands were Adam Bristol, William Russell, and Beth Vaughan. Adam Bristol earned 7th chair middle school trombone for the entire state, Beth Vaughan made 2nd chair in the All-State White Band, and William Russell made 13th chair in the All-State Red Band.

In February, **Mary Reagan Starrett** and **Logan Stevens** were selected for the 2013 Southeastern United States High



School Honor Bands at Troy University. Also during this month, several of our Middle and High School Band members were accepted to the 2012 Auburn University Symphonic Honor Bands, including **Adam Bristol, Eric Crenshaw, and Mary Reagan Starrett. Will Brunson** also represented Montgomery Catholic at the 28th Annual Alabama Honor Band Festival in Tuscaloosa.

In March, the MCPS Concert Band performed at the Alabama Bandmasters

Music Performance Assessment in Alexander City. The Band received scores of Excellent from the judges on their stage performance and an impressive score of Superior in the Sight-Reading portion of the event for the second year in a row.

In April, a record number of our Band members performed at the Alabama Bandmasters Solo and Ensemble Festival. These students performed challenging music repertoire for discerning judges as soloists or in small groups, and they earned Superior ratings on a total of 25 different performances.

In May, the Band capped off a great year with our annual Spring Concert. This event featured the Beginning, Middle School, Concert, and Jazz Bands, as well as the Percussion Ensemble. Not only was this a great performance with which to end the year, those in attendance were treated to a fantastic guest appearance by our 7-12 principal, **Mr. Chad Barwick.**

Looking ahead, we are excited for the new opportunities the 2013-2014 school year holds for the MCPS Band program. The Marching Knights will have its largest membership in six years, and our Beginning Band will expand to include 5th grade students at Holy Spirit and St. Bede. We are looking forward to our best year yet with the MCPS Band program.

Dear Knights in Shining Most people are familiar with

the concepts of development and public relations. In recent years the word "advancement" has become a new standard term to umbrella initiatives in development, public relations, enrollment, and faith formation.

Advancement is a team approach which calls every person in the organization to get on board as ambassadors for the mission of the school at every level.

In the 30+ years she served as the cafeteria manager, Dolly Barranco greeted all who came in contact with her with a warm smile. And if this lady legend of Catholic High could have been with us for her 100th birthday this year, the crowd to wish her well would be out the door.

Today Miss Dolly's memory is etched in the school activity center named for her as the Dolly Barranco Center (DBC). She continues to flash that warm smile and twinkling eyes to each of us as we pass through the DBC for meetings. Mass, lunch, breaks, and a host of other events.

Miss Dolly was a gentle spirit yet had a watchful eye. In a heartbeat she would call you out for misbehavior or give a warning that she would have to call your mother if you were dating the wrong person. If you looked troubled,

she always had time to listen and offer advice, often accompanied by a free meal.

The faculty received special treatment, hiding out in the pantry while she fed them goodies. Zacchaeus (Jericho) Ann Power ('61)

In following the news of the papal election, I came across an old article on Cardinal Bergoglio which mentioned I had been idling my life away

Just so. I had been. Anxious to see what magnetized the crowd, I bit my nail to the quick. The sycamore's branches sprouted overhead. I could not reach to climb. Then someone, noticing, hoisted me shoulder high; I pulled myself up, sat there surveying the crowd. No matter that I was spectacle. No one even noticed. Transfixion. Snared like some startled prey, simultaneously I felt capture and deliverance; my hopes pinioned, I think of the sycamore, which could have been for me a similar casket, encasement in the shrouds of self-absorption, a journey with the same ending as

a homily he had given in 2002 on May 25th, an Argentine national holiday held on the anniversary of the country's First National Government which was celebrated originally in 1810 following the May Revolution.

At the Te Deum the "...cardinal asked the people of Argentina to do as Zacchaeus had done in the Gospel. Here was a sinister loan shark. But taking account of his moral lowliness, he climbed up into a sycamore tree, to see Jesus and let himself be seen and converted by Him." *

I believe that this is the same message Pope Francis would wish to send to the world today. It is a message from a man who, in humility, walks in the steps of Jesus and, in doing so, energizes a world weary of secular values.

With closed eyes, I recapture that moment which transcended all that went before, all that has come after: the quiet tenderness and there is no one else there is that instant alone the gaze-given recognition, the silence, the hunger-feasting in that moment, the flash-flame, desire.

I had been idling my life away.




